

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT & CODES

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

To keep neighborhoods safe, healthy and vibrant, there are local municipal rules for properties about everything from structural defects to uncut grass and junk in the yard/porch. The Codes Enforcement Officer is continually in the process of performing exterior inspections of properties within the Borough. These inspections include commercial and residential (owner-occupied and non-owner-occupied) properties. The responsibility for maintenance and upkeep falls on the property owners, operators, and occupants of the property. Violations are enforced by fines and other costs.

Grass/Weeds/Trees

- No grass, weeds, or other vegetation not edible or planted for some useful purpose shall be allowed to grow to a height more than six inches, to emit any unpleasant or noxious odor or to conceal any filthy deposit.
- Do not allow cut grass, hedge clippings, brush, or other cut materials to lie in borough streets. This debris accumulates and tends to clog storm sewer catch basins and lines.
- Tree branches and shrubs overhanging the streets, highways, avenues and alleys are to be a clear height of twelve (12) feet above the surface of a street, highway, avenue or alley.
- Branches and shrubs overhanging any sidewalk adjacent to the property must be a clear height of eight (8) feet above the surface of the sidewalk on or adjacent to the owner's property.

FIREWORKS REGULATIONS

Following are the restrictions to adhere to when setting off fireworks from Pennsylvania State Police's FAQ page on fireworks. Visit psp.pa.gov/public-safety/Pages/fireworks-safety.aspx for more information.

- · They cannot be ignited or discharged on public or private property without express permission of the property owner.
- · They cannot be directed at another person.
- · They cannot be discharged from or directed at a building or vehicle.
- They cannot be discharged within 150 feet of a building or vehicle regardless if the building or vehicle is owned by the user of the consumer fireworks.
- · They cannot be discharged while the person is under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance or another drug.

In observance of the Borough Public Park Ordinance #710: Setting off fireworks in Borough parks is strictly prohibited.

COMMUNITY IDENTITY & DOWNTOWN MASTER PLAN

The Community Identity and Downtown Master Plan (CIDMP) was established to improve New Cumberland Borough's image while establishing a plan for improving and promoting the downtown area as an attractive place to live, work, and play. It is a framework to manage change and enhancements in the Borough over the next twenty years and beyond. It's intended to be a guiding yet flexible document. New Cumberland Borough will be the entity in charge of incrementally implementing the master plan; however, private sector, non-profit entities and individuals will have a partnership role for many of the projects.



The CIDMP builds upon the 2019 Revitalization Strategy and the 2021-2022 New Cumberland Borough Community and Economic Development Plan, which outlined the overall goal to make New Cumberland a better place to live, locate a business, and visit, and identified the following five priorities:

- Community Identity and Promotion to communicate the value of New Cumberland's past, present, and future locally and across the Region.
- Economic Vibrancy to support functional, physical, and other aspects of the business community.
- A Safe, Active, and Healthy Community to renew community facilities, programs, and services that encourage public health, safety, and wellness.
- Housing and Property Values to enhance housing choices, strengthen property values, and encourage flood mitigation.
- Arts, Culture, and Entertainment to expand programs and events that foster development and appreciation of the arts.

This CIDMP was identified as an outcome of the Economic Vibrancy and Community Identity and Promotion priorities.

PROCESS

The CIDMP planning process occurred from May 2022 to January 2023 and was led by Borough-hired Mahan Rykiel Associates. It included an online survey, multiple workshops, and public meetings held in the Borough, market research, and a field assessment. The Borough established a Steering Committee who provided direction throughout the process and included Valerie Copenhaver, Faith Curran, Nate Dysard, Don Kibler, Rob Kline, Gibby Parthemore, Gennifer Richie, Chris Semoff, Cindy Washburn and JoLynn Weist. We want to extend a big thank you to members of the committee

as well as to all those that participated in the community engagement opportunities. We are also grateful to the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development for a \$40,000 Municipal Assistance Program grant that helped make this project happen.

COMMUNITY IDENTITY

During the planning process, a community brand vision, messaging, and communication strategy were developed to help inform future community and economic development decisions and to market and promote our community as a great place to live, learn, work, and play. Reference the BrandTouch Manual, to see how the brand works.

Downtown *Design Guidelines* were developed to ensure that new construction and proposed alterations to existing properties will enhance, rather than adversely affect, the architectural character of New Cumberland Borough. This intent is two-fold and is the same regardless of whether the application concerns an existing property or a proposal for new construction. First, the guidelines provide the owners of downtown properties assistance in making decisions about maintenance, improvements, or architecturally-sensitive design within the existing surrounding context. Second, they provide Borough leadership with a framework for objective evaluation of proposed improvements or designs.

DOWNTOWN MASTER PLAN

The *Downtown Master Plan* includes a broad range of short- and long-term recommendations, building upon a foundation of existing revitalization successes and projects underway.

PROJECTS UNDERWAY


The Borough has initiated conceptual design work on several key projects that will strengthen downtown assets and serve as a foundation for additional recommendations outlined in the master plan. These include enhancements to Riverside Park, Third Avenue and Market Square, and Borough Park. If grant funding applications are successful, these projects will advance to more detailed design and implementation.

DOWNTOWN RECOMMENDATIONS

Additional recommendations for the downtown include potential public realm improvements for park spaces and streetscapes and redevelopment opportunities for several properties (should property owners wish to make changes). Some recommendations, such as wayfinding and parking, apply to the entire downtown while other recommendations are specific to certain geographies within downtown. Key priority projects, in addition to those already underway, include two catalyst projects and two streetscape priority projects.

NEW CUMBERLAND BOROUGH BRAND STATEMENT

Resilient transmission for a reliable future

INTRODUCTION:

A resilient transmission system helps us deliver safe and reliable service across our distribution lines to your homes and businesses.

That's why we continuously invest in transmission projects to improve reliability, protect the grid from extreme weather, reduce outages, and enable renewable energy interconnections.

We've started construction to rebuild a 3.2-mile transmission line from the west side of the Susquehanna River to our Harrisburg substation. This line serves customers in the Harrisburg and New Cumberland areas.

CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS:

During the spring and summer months, we'll be drilling holes and installing foundations. We'll also gather necessary materials to support the project and begin tree-trimming work, so the area is clear for new poles.

DOG LICENSE

Cumberland County requires that all dogs, three months or older, be licensed by January 1 of each year. Annual dog licenses range from \$4.50-\$8.50 and lifetime dog licenses range from \$21.50-\$51.50. Annual licenses can be purchased at New Cumberland Borough at 1120 Market St, New Cumberland or online at <u>doglicenses</u>. <u>us</u>. Lifetime Licenses must be submitted by mail or in person at the Cumberland County Treasurer's Office, 1 Courthouse Square, Room 201, Carlisle. Lifetime Licenses **cannot** be purchased online or at the Borough. Why should you get your dog licensed?

- If your dog gets lost, a current license is the fastest way for it to be reunited with you.
- Licensing reduces the number of dogs in shelters, thereby creating space for truly homeless pets and reducing euthanization rates.
- A dog without a current license can be transported to shelters far from their homes, and eventually adopted out if no owner is identified.
- · A dog license helps to control the stray dog population.
- · Violators will be cited with a maximum fine of \$300 per violation plus court costs.

REPORTING STREET LIGHT OUTAGES

Streetlights are installed and maintained by PPL. Please call PPL directly to report broken lights or electrical outages at 1-800-DIAL-PPL (1-800-342-5775). Be prepared to provide a street address where the light is located. It is also helpful to provide the poll number, which is posted on each streetlight. POLICE, FIRE & EMS

DRUG TAKE-BACK BOX

Dispose of your unused or expired prescription and over-the-counter medication safely and close to home.

The New Cumberland Borough Police Department has a Drug Take-Back Box available for drug drop off in its lobby during normal business hours. The Take-Back Box is located inside the police lobby to the left of the entry door. Residents can bring their medications into the lobby and deposit them into the box for safe disposal.

This program allows residents to drop off unused or unwanted medications and remove the risk of these medications being misused or stolen. All medications should be either in a pill bottle or in a plastic bag prior to being deposited in the box. Please do not put loose pills into the Drug Take-Back Box and liquids are not accepted at any time. Remove personal information from original container. Individuals utilizing the Drop Box will not be questioned, required to provide ID or charged a fee.

This is a voluntary, free service provided only as time is available. There is no guarantee made or assurance given against loss, theft, or damage to the premises and if any such action should occur New Cumberland Borough, the New Cumberland Police Department or any of its officers, employees, members, or agents will not be liable. A CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS ISN'T JUST A CALL FOR FIREFIGHTERS & EMTs

New Cumberland is like most towns throughout Pennsylvania, when a house catches fire, someone has a medical emergency, or a car accident happens, volunteer firefighters and EMTs are responding to the call. The New Cumberland Volunteer Fire Dept responds to approximately 1,500 calls every year. Not only in our community, but also as mutual aid support in Cumberland, Dauphin, and York Counties. In doing so, our volunteers give over 4,600 manhours annually between running calls, training, station duties, administrative support, and fundraising.

Always been intrigued by the thought of being a firefighter and/or an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) but don't have any experience and don't know where to start? No problem. Join the NCFD and we will assign you a mentor who will help guide you through the training process. You will learn real world skills through hands-on training and running real emergency calls. We even cover the cost of any classes that you attend. That's right – in exchange for volunteering your time with us and running calls, you can get your certifications at no cost to you!

Not interested in fighting fires or riding in an ambulance? There are many ways to serve your community as a volunteer without running calls. We have members between the ages of 18-80 who help with fundraising events, grant writing, equipment maintenance, traffic control at incidents, community engagement, and administrative support. Volunteering doesn't have to take a huge commitment either. Even if you have just a few hours a month available, your help can make a difference.



Being a volunteer with your local fire department, in any capacity, is one of the most meaningful ways to serve your family, friends, neighbors and your community. 

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE RECYCLING



Saturday, June 17th 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) consists of products in the home which are corrosive (drain cleaners or bleach), flammable (gasoline or kerosene), reactive (chemistry kits and photographic chemicals) or toxic (pesticides and insecticides). Penn Waste is NOT authorized to pick up these materials. These materials may NOT be placed in your curbside trash. Cumberland County offers a HHW collection recycling program to give the residents of Cumberland County an alternative disposal method for these types of wastes. Bring your HHW to Cumberland County Recycling Center, 1001 Claremont Rd, Carlisle June 17th. Appointments are required and a fee of \$0.55/lb will be charged.
