NEW RESIDENT INFORMATION

Welcome to your new home in New Cumberland Borough! We hope the information provided below helps you.

Dog License

Cumberland County requires that all dogs, three months or older, be licensed by January 1 of each year. Annual dog licenses range from \$4.50-\$8.50 and lifetime dog licenses range from \$21.50-\$51.50. Annual licenses can be purchased at New Cumberland Borough at 1120 Market St, New Cumberland or online at **doglicenses.us/PA/Cumberland**. Lifetime Licenses must be submitted by mail or in person at the Cumberland County Treasurer's Office, 1 Courthouse Square, Room 201, Carlisle. Lifetime Licenses cannot be purchased online or at the Borough. Find more details on **newcumberlandborough. com/license-your-dog-its-the-law/**.

Driver's License & Motor Vehicle Registration

Out of state driver's licenses must be converted within 60 days of establishing residency. New residents must apply for a title and registration for their vehicle within 20 days. Annual vehicle registration and inspection are required in PA. For more information, visit dmv.pa.gov.

FALL CLEANUP

LEAF COLLECTION -

Leaf collection begins the third week of October.

- · All leaves are to be raked into the street at the curb line.
- The schedule will repeat each week beginning with the first area.
- · In the event of inclement weather or equipment problems, the schedule will resume where interrupted.
- •The street sweeper will work in conjunction with the leaf collection equipment by sweeping the center of each street ahead of the leaf collector and then by sweeping behind it along the curb.
- · Please DO NOT place any large objects with the leaves such as branches, sticks, bricks, stones, etc., that could damage the leaf collection equipment.
- •The collection schedule for each area will end on the designated day during the first full week of December. This may change due to early winter weather events.
- · There will be no alley pick-ups.
- · Please refrain from parking close to leaf piles. Our equipment has difficulty reaching the curb line when vehicles are parked too close to leaf piles.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION -

What: Yard waste is material such as tree trimmings, shrubbery, and other organic landscape vegetation. It does NOT include grass clippings, fruits and vegetables, tree stumps, dirt, and stones. These non-yard waste items can be disposed of with your normal trash collection if it is in a container. For grass clippings, it's suggested you practice grass-cycling and leave them on your lawn. The benefits are great for your lawn, saves you time and keeps them out of the landfill.

How: Place yard waste in biodegradable brown paper bags or bundle it with biodegradable twine in easy-to handle bundles. Bundles may be no longer than five feet in length; not exceed six inches in diameter; and not weigh more than 30 pounds each. An unlimited number or brown paper bags or bundles may be placed at the curb. Do not put yard waste in plastic bags. It will not be collected.

When: Pick up is October 21, 2023. Once prepared, yard waste must be placed at the curb before 6 a.m. Do not put yard waste out during your regular collection day.

LARGE ITEM DISPOSAL

One large household item per week will be collected from a residence by Penn Waste, Inc. on any regular collection day. This service is only available to residential customers included in the Borough's trash collection and recycling contract. You must call Penn Waste to arrange your large item pickup at (717) 767-4456 or (866) 575-8720 at least 48 hours prior to your regular collection day.

Acceptable items:

- · Appliances such as Refrigerators and Washing Machines
- · Carpet (48" max length, rolled and tied)
- Furniture

- · Car Tires (tires only and must be removed from rims)
- · Scrap Metal (48" max length)
- · Mattresses & Box Springs

The following items will NOT be collected:

- · Electronics You can recycle electronics at Cumberland County's Electronics Recycling Center, which is located at 1001 Claremont Road in Carlisle.
- · Paints, stains, chemicals, and liquids
- · Automobile parts
- · Tires on rims
- · No loose piles. All small items must be boxed.

- · Construction Material or Debris: drywall, brick, block, treated lumber, roofing shingles, ceiling tiles and concrete
- Batteries
- · Household Hazardous Waste
- · Commercial and Industrial Waste
- · No items which are too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL



Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) consists of products in the home which are corrosive (drain cleaners or bleach), flammable (gasoline or kerosene), reactive (chemistry kits and photographic chemicals) or toxic (pesticides and insecticides). Penn Waste is NOT authorized to pick up these materials. These materials may NOT be placed in your curbside trash.

Cumberland County offers a HHW collection recycling program to give the residents of Cumberland County an alternative disposal method for these types of wastes. There is one more event in 2023: Thursday, October 26.

TREES. WHERE ARE THEY GOING & WHY?

No matter the route, when you enter the Borough of New Cumberland, a noticeable canopy of trees is appreciated. However, age, disease, and strong storms to name a few, are taking a toll on our shade trees. What can you do to maintain and increase our shade trees canopy? Plant a tree – the right tree in the right spot is the key to decades of shade, songbirds, energy savings and beauty. Recommendations for the variety of trees to plant can be secured from a reputable arborist or a community forester from the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

Why are trees disappearing in the Borough and across the region? This article is the first in a quarterly series looking at factors that contribute to the loss of trees and our tree canopy.

Stressful conditions can reduce a tree's ability to produce energy as well as force the tree to divert energy from growth, flowering, and fruiting to defense. Reducing energy production results in less storage of energy (starch in woody plants) and can exhaust a trees' defenses. Some stressful conditions are acute and may not last very long like a seasonal drought, while others are more chronic such as compacted soil conditions. It is often when trees are under stress from abiotic (non-living) causes and energy and defenses become limited that biotic stressors like insect pests and disease pathogens are more easily able to establish, exacerbating tree decline and death.

The struggles trees face when growing in many urban or suburban settings can mean the difference between healthy trees that provide shade, boosts property values, and improves air quality or expensive removals. When we think about tree stressors, we



often think about insects and diseases that can certainly impact trees, but there are numerous abiot ic (non-living) stressors that cause the demise of thousands of urban trees. Those abiotic tree stressors can be grouped into several categories such as environmental factors, site factors, and human activities. The first topic in this quarterly series is environmental stressors.

Environmental Stressors

The first environmental stress that comes to most minds is drought. Water stress may be caused by a lack of rain, or it may be caused by inadequate soil space from which to draw water. Drought is a primary contributing factor to tree decline, environmental stressors like insufficient water are often the primary cause. Even with adequate soil space and precipitation, drought stress can occur from root injuries that short-circuit the tree's ability to take up water and nutrients that may be available.

Another environmental stress can be a late spring frost or freeze that damage newly emerging leaves. Water expands as it freezes in plant tissues, bursting cell walls. When the tissue thaws again, the ruptured cells die and darken soon after. Tender tissues are prone to such injury in late spring frosts. If leaves are damaged in the spring, the tree will need to dip into reserve (or stored) energy to create new leaves needed for photosynthesis that growing season.

Extreme heat can be a major stress on some species of trees, causing moisture loss, leaf scorch, and premature leaf drop. In many cases, heat stress includes a component of drought stress, as the tree moves more water via evapotranspiration to combat the effects of heat, often exceeding the available water in the ground. This stressor can be exacerbated by site conditions found in parking lots or downtown streetscapes with limited soil space and lots of reflected heat.

Snow and ice loading during the winter can cause major limb breakage, which results in a reduction in a tree's canopy. That lost leafy canopy reduces the trees ability to produce energy for itself, leading to stress on the tree. Ice can increase the weight of a branch by 30 times or greater, depending on the thickness of the ice, making it more susceptible to breakage. BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS

It is hard to believe that summer is over and the kids are back at school. The New Cumberland Police Department would like you to keep these safety tips in mind when travelling in New Cumberland Borough.

- 1. Watch your speed in school zones! Be aware that school zone speed limits may vary in hours of operation but are always 15 MPH.
- 2. New Cumberland Borough is a walkable town. Slowdown in residential areas. Watch for children crossing the street and congregating near bus stops.
- 3. Do not pass a school bus that stops to load or unload children. Traffic in both directions on all Borough roadways must stop when students are entering or exiting a school bus (the red flashing lights and extended stop sign arms are your cues to stop).
- 4. Be alert! The area ten (10) feet around a school bus is where children are in the most danger of being struck. Children walking to and from their bus are usually very comfortable with their surroundings and more likely to take risks, ignore hazards, or fail to look both ways when crossing a street.
- 5. Watch for bikes. Children on bicycles are unpredictable.
- 6. Always stop when directed to do so by a school patrol sign, a Police Officer, or a designated crossing guard.
- 7. If you are dropping off or picking up children from school use the designated drop off/pick-up zone. Follow the rules established by the school when completing this task.

ESCAPE PLANNING |

October 8-14, 2023 is Fire Prevention Week. Plan Ahead! If a fire breaks out in your home you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

- MAKE a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- XNOW at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.
-))) HAVE an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- >>> PRACTICE your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
- PRACTICE using different ways out.
- TEACH children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
-))) CLOSE doors behind you as you leave.

IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

- If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
-))) CALL the fire department from outside your home.

Thank you to New Cumberland Borough's Fire, EMS and Police that help keep our community safe!

FACTS

- (1) A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- (!) According to an NFPA survey, only one of every three American households have actually developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.
- While 71% of Americans have an escape plan in case of a fire, only 47% of those have practiced it.
- ! One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is often less. And only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

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
